## Some tricky questions (fiction or non-fiction)...



Can you find two words which tell you what the main character is like?

Which words help to describe the main character's feelings or emotions?

Which words or phrases help to describe the setting?

Which characters did the author want you to like? How do you know?

Which characters did the author not want you to like? How do you know?

Can you think of a different way to end the story?

Can you think of an idea for a sequel (next part) to the story?

## Talk About Your Book!

Being able to read the words in your reading book is only one step along the journey to becoming a reader. You also need to understand what each book you read is about, how to find out information from it, and why the characters act the way they do.



When your teacher hears you read, he or she has to check you know the answers to all sorts of questions about your books. This booklet contains examples of the sorts of questions you need to be able to answer.

Don't answer <u>all</u> the questions every time you read a book, or you will be up until past bedtime!

Choose 3 or 4 questions and try to answer them in as much detail as you can.

## For any book (fiction and non-fiction)...

What made you choose this book?

What do you think it will be about?

Which part did you like best? Why?

Did you find anything funny/sad?

Who did you like best in the story? Why?

What did you not like? Why?

Did any part of the story surprise you?

What might happen next? Why?

Did you think any of the words were interesting or unusual? Why?

What sort of a book is this? (information, story, poetry)

Have you read any books that are similar to this one, or by the same author?
